Excerpts from the Message of the Holy Father, Pope Francis on the 54th World Day of Prayer for Vocations:



Jesus is anointed by the Spirit and sent. To be a missionary disciple means to share actively in the mission of Christ. Jesus himself described that mission in the synagogue of Nazareth in these words: "The Spirit of the Lord is upon me, because he has anointed to bring good news to the poor. He has sent me to proclaim release to the captives and recovery of sight to the blind, to let the oppressed go free, and to proclaim the year of the Lord's favour" (Lk 4:18-19). This is also our mission: to be anointed by the Spirit, and to go out to our brothers and sisters in order to proclaim the word and to be for them a means of salvation.



Jesus is at our side every step of the way. The questions lurking in human hearts and the real challenges of life can make us feel bewildered, inadequate and hopeless. The Christian mission might appear to be mere utopian illusion or at least something beyond our reach. Yet if we contemplate the risen Jesus walking alongside the disciples of Emmaus (cf. Lk 24:13-15), we can be filled with new confidence. In that Gospel scene, we have a true "liturgy of the street", preceding that of the word and the breaking of the bread. We see that, at every step of the way, Jesus is at our side! The two disciples, overwhelmed by the scandal of the cross, return home on the path of defeat. Their hearts are broken, their hopes dashed and their dreams shattered. The joy of the Gospel has yielded to sadness.

What does Jesus do? He does not judge them, but walks with them. Instead of raising a wall, he opens a breach. Gradually he transforms their discouragement. He makes their hearts burn within them, and he opens their eyes by proclaiming the word and breaking the bread. In the same way, a Christian does not bear the burden of mission alone, but realizes, even amid weariness and misunderstanding, that "Jesus walks with him, speaks to him, breathes

with him, works with him. He senses Jesus alive with him in the midst of the missionary enterprise" (Evangelii Gaudium, 266).



Jesus makes the seed grow. Finally, it is important to let the Gospel teach us the way of proclamation. At times, even with the best intentions, we can indulge in a certain hunger for power, proselytism or intolerant fanaticism. Yet the Gospel tells us to reject the idolatry of power and success, undue concern for structures, and a kind of anxiety that has more to do with the spirit of conquest than that of service. The seed of the Kingdom, however tiny, unseen and at times insignificant, silently continues to grow, thanks

to God's tireless activity. "The kingdom of God is as if a man should scatter seed on the ground, and should sleep or rise night and day, and the seed should sprout and grow, he knows not how" (Mk 4:26-27). This is our first reason for confidence:

God surpasses all our expectations and constantly surprises us by his generosity. He makes our efforts bear fruit beyond all human calculation.

With this confidence born of the Gospel, we become open to the silent working of the Spirit, which is the basis of mission. There can be no promotion of vocations or Christian mission apart from constant contemplative prayer. The Christian life needs to be nourished by attentive listening to God's word and, above all, by the cultivation of a personal relationship with the Lord in Eucharistic adoration, the privileged "place" for our encounter with God.

Points for Meditation on the Pope's Message

- 1. When did I receive the Sacrament of Confirmation? Have I tried my best to live the Christian values I learned? Did the Sacrament of Confirmation change my way of life for the better? Did I share the joy of "being with Jesus" to my family, friends, and to my community?
- 2. Do I participate actively in the programs, activities and liturgical celebrations of my Parish Community? How often do I participate in the Parish's activities? Did I share the joy of serving the community also with others? Do I let others discover and encounter Christ when I am working for the Parish Community?
- 3. Do I find meaning in serving in the Church? Do I find life in being with the Church? Did I become more prayerful and more charitable when I serve in the Church?
- 4. Have I developed a devotion and love towards the Word of God and the Blessed Sacrament?
- 5. Do I include the Parish Community in my vocation discernment? Is the Parish Community part of my life journey as a Christian?

3rd Day of Triduum

Jesus Nourishes Seeds of Vocations

Introduction: Jesus, the missionary par excellence, also nurtures seeds of vocations. He does this when He walks with us. All of us have the seeds of vocation, which have to be nurtured and taken care. Jesus is, first of all, the one who inspires the care for vocations in our communities. When the Parish community is conducive enough for vocation discernment, the discerner can readily discover what God wants for him. This can only happen when the Parish community is attentive to the celebration of the holy liturgy, the daily living and witnessing of the Word of God, and the celebration of the sacraments. With the help of God's ministers and workers in the Church, every discerner is helped to discover God's calling for them. Let us pray, therefore, that as we pray for more ministers and good laborers in the Church, may these same persons be imbued and empowered by the Holy Spirit to bring Jesus to those who are searching for meaning in life.

Introduction: Every mission comes from on high, so does holy vocations. There can be no authentic missionary activity if vocations are not implored and asked from the Lord. All missionary activity, when authentic, is inspired by the Spirit who anoints and consecrates the chosen towards the mission entrusted to them by the Father. Jesus, the missionary par excellence, model of all missionaries and of obedience to the Father, makes himself present also among the ministers who care for vocations. They, too, have a mission to care for those who are chosen for missions. These missions are broadened, thanks to Pope Francis' rallying call to everyone to go to the peripheries and bring Jesus to them. This rallying call is also for all of us who implore and ask the Lord for more vocations: let us pray for more vocations, for the mission that will be entrusted to them is surely given and inspired from above.

From the Writings of St. Hannibal Mary di Francia:

Our Lord Jesus Christ's command is very clear: "There is a large harvest, but few workers to gather it in: Pray, therefore, to the owner of the harvest that he will send out workers to gather in his harvest." MISSALETTE FOR THE 54TH WORLD DAY OF PRAYER FOR VOCATIONS

Introduction:

The Eucharist is the source and summit of the Church's missionary activity. It is in the context of the celebration of the Eucharist that we, the People of God, are gathered and let ourselves be empowered by the Word of God and the Liturgy, so that the mission we discover in ourselves may become salvific and a visible sign of God's love to those we meet everyday, and to those in the "peripheries". Our Holy Father, Pope Francis, continues his rallying call to make ourselves available for missions to the peripheries. But only we can do so, when we are nourished by contemplative prayer, the liturgy and the sacraments.

On this 54th World Day of Prayer for Vocations, celebrated in the Fourth Sunday of Easter, also known as the "Good Shepherd Sunday", we are led to contemplate on Jesus, the Good Shepherd who continues to look out for us and bring us to the Father, opens the door for us to discover what the Father has in store for us, and who continues to journey with at every step of our way. In this Holy Mass, let us pray for more vocations to the Church. May there be a great increase of holy vocations, ready, generous and docile enough to be sent to the peripheries of our modern age.

LITURGY OF THE WORD

First Reading: ACTS 2:14A, 36-41
Then Peter stood up with the Eleven, raised his voice, and proclaimed: "Let the whole house of Israel know for certain that God has made both Lord and Christ, this Jesus whom you crucified."

Now when they heard this, they were cut to the heart, and they asked Peter and the other apostles, "What are we to do, my brothers?"

Peter said to them,

"Repent and be baptized, every one of you, in the name of Jesus Christ for the forgiveness of your sins; and you will receive the gift of the Holy Spirit. For the promise is made to you and to your children and to all those far off,

whomever the Lord our God will call."

He testified with many other arguments, and was exhorting them, "Save yourselves from this corrupt generation."

Those who accepted his message were baptized, and about three thousand persons were added that day.

Beloved:

If you are patient when you suffer for doing what is good, this is a grace before God. For to this you have been called, because Christ also suffered for you, leaving you

an example that you should follow in his footsteps. He committed no sin, and no deceit was found in his mouth. When he was insulted, he returned no insult; when he suffered, he did not threaten; instead, he handed himself over to the one who judges justly. He himself bore our sins in his body upon the cross, so that, free from sin, we might live for righteousness.

By his wounds you have been healed. For you had gone astray like sheep, but you have now returned to the shepherd and guardian of your souls.

Jesus said:

"Amen, amen, I say to you, whoever does not enter a sheepfold through the gate but climbs over elsewhere is a thief and a robber. But whoever enters through the gate is the shepherd of the sheep. The gatekeeper opens it for him, and the sheep hear his voice, as the shepherd calls his own sheep by name and leads them out. When he has driven out all his own, he walks ahead of them, and the sheep follow him, because they recognize his voice. But they will not follow a stranger; they will run away from him, because they do not recognize the voice of strangers." Although Jesus used this figure of speech, the Pharisees did not realize what he was trying to tell them.

So Jesus said again, "Amen, amen, I say to you, I am the gate for the sheep. All who came before me are thieves and robbers, but the sheep did not listen to them. I am the gate. Whoever enters through me will be saved, and will come in and go out and find pasture. A thief comes only to steal and slaughter and destroy; I came so that they might have life and have it more abundantly."


